Locally Native Plants for Bay Area Gardens, a talk by Arvind Kumar Wednesday, September 7 7:30 - 9:00 PM

The Bay Area is home to a great diversity of native plants that have evolved to fill its many ecological niches –

microclimates, soils, aspects, and hydrology. This talk will introduce you to locally native plants that are suitable for the home garden: plants that are beautiful, easy to grow and with great habitat value.

Arvind Kumar leads volunteer workdays at the Lake Cunningham Native Garden in San Jose (see page ). He is a past President of our CNPS Chapter and has served on the State CNPS board. He is an engineer by training, a lazy gardener by choice, and a bit obsessed about native plants.

#### **CHAPTER ACTIVITIES**

#### **CNPS SCV Nursery at Hidden Villa**

Nursery volunteers continue to propagate plants, raising funds for the Chapter through sales from its online store at california-native-plant-society-santa-clara-valleychapter.square.site.

The online nursery store holds periodic pop-up sales. Current Chapter members are notified by email before each pop-up sale starts. Each pop-up sale lasts only until all of our pickup slots are filled (typically just two or three days), so make sure that your membership is up-to-date if you would like to receive a notice before each sale.

You can verify the status of your membership on the CNPS member portal, which is available from the "My Profile" link on www.cnps.org.



Our nursery's fall plant sale will once again be online. Our online nursery store will be open for purchases the week before October 8 with scheduled pickups during the 50th Anniversary Celebration event. Our nursery will not be open for sales during the event, but there will be a limited number of plants available for purchase at our Chapter's book booth.

Proceeds from plant sales are the major source of funding for Chapter activities and scholarships.

#### Wildflower Ambassador Program

Our new Wildflower Ambassador program has a goal of inspiring gardeners across our region to grow native host plants that support local butterflies, moths, bees and birds. The "WFAs" have been busy raising awareness and have distributed over 170 packets of native seeds in the past two months.

In addition to promoting native plants on social media and distributing seeds via mail and Little Free Libraries, the group hosted seed giveaways at three libraries: Woodside, Belmont, and San Carlos. Since these events were part of the San Mateo County Library (SMCL) system's lecture series "Master Gardeners: Fall Vegetable Gardening and Seed Swap," the WFAs gave away packets of Larner Seed's "Pollinator Mix" along with CNPS handouts, brochures and membership applications.

Most attendees were unaware that native wildflowers such as phacelia, lupine, gumplant and sunflower could attract a vast array of pollinators that could help them boost their vegetable and fruit garden yields. Once they understood this dynamic, they were eager to plant them in the fall and winter rains, then watch for increased pollinator diversity in their gardens throughout the spring and summer. We are grateful to Lynne Fetter with SMCL for facilitating this wonderful opportunity!

The WFAs have also distributed over 70 packets of narrowleaf milkweed (Asclepias fascicularis), along with tips for growing it successfully. These were very well received, as one attendee said, "This makes me feel empowered to do something to fight back against the monarch's tragic decline."

Several others expressed similar sentiments, citing the recent announcement from The International Union for the Conservation of Nature that the **monarchs are officially listed as endangered**. The heightened awareness about the monarchs facilitated many discussions in person and online about endangered butterflies, bees and other pollinators.

Other seeds and plants distributed included hummingbird sage plants (*Salvia spathacea*), seeds for California poppies (*Eschscholzia californica*) and bladderpod (*Peritoma arborea*). The WFAs are also developing content to promote the fall native planting season, with featured plants and pollinators, native gardening best practices and of course, more free wildflower seeds! The WFAs will host a table at the CNPS SCV 50th Anniversary Celebration (see page 1) and look forward to seeing many of you there!

#### Chapter Guidelines - We Need Your Vote

Our Chapter guidelines define the basic rules and policies for the Chapter's organization and activities. During the pandemic, we discovered that we had included requirements such as holding four general meetings each year that were not possible to follow under the circumstances in which we found ourselves. Revisions to the current guidelines require a vote of the membership which makes it difficult to address problems like this in a timely fashion.

Our Board has approved a revision to the current guidelines to address this and other issues found since our last major update in 2019. The most significant change in the revised guidelines moves authority to make updates to the Chapter's guidelines from a vote of the membership to our Chapter's board. Other changes include:

- Updating the Chapter's Fiscal Year. Our Chapter's fiscal year is currently the calendar year. The Chapter is required to provide annual reports to the CNPS state office at the end of the state office's fiscal year, which runs from April 1 through March 31. This change aligns our Chapter's fiscal year with the state organization to simplify reporting.
- Updating the leadership term to run from June 1 of the election year through the following May 31.

  This change means that the leadership team in charge of the annual report to the state office is the same team that led the Chapter during the majority of the reporting period.
- Updating the definition of Chapter membership to remove references to categories that no longer exist (Family memberships) and other membership processes outside of Chapter control.
- Updating the composition of the Executive Committee. The Executive committee will include all officers (President, Vice President, Treasurer, Chapter Council Delegate, Past President and Recording Secretary).
- Merges the Nominating Committee's responsibilities into the Leadership Development Committee.

- Removes the requirement to hold a specific number of membership meetings each year.
- Changes the Chapter's election format from an inperson election to an electronic one. Our Chapter has around 1,000 members at the moment. Switching to an electronic election allows broader membership participation.

The General Membership will vote on these revisions during our annual meeting on October 8. The guidelines will become effective immediately after ratification by the membership. That will extend the term of the current leadership team through May 31, 2023 and will move our next Chapter Officer election from November, 2022 to February, 2023.

# **Gardens Wanted for 2023 Growing Natives Garden Tour**

Calling all landscape designers and homeowners: The Growing Natives Garden Tour (GNGT) is seeking home gardens located in Santa Clara and San Mateo counties for next year's tour scheduled for Saturday, April 1 and Sunday, April 2, 2023.



Gardens should feature California native plants prominently (i.e., native plants should be at least 70% of the garden, and the garden should not include invasive plants). We are looking for attractive gardens that promote habitat creation, sustainability, and water conservation. Designers and/or homeowners must be available as docents for the garden on their tour day. #### The Edgewood Fire and Dirca Occidentalis

The fire that spread from the southwest into the Edgewood Park and Natural Preserve on June 21 was contained south of the Clarkia Trail by June 24 after burning about 20 acres. Fortunately, the worst effects of the fire on the Preserve were averted. However, it did burn into the habitat of one of Edgewood's rare plants, Western leatherwood (Dirca occidentalis), which is ranked 1B.2 by CNPS\*.

A visual survey of the fire effects by Paul Heiple and our Chapter's Edgewood weeders revealed that about half of the *Dirca* colony was saved from burning by the bulldozer line plowed through the center of the population. While preserving these plants from burning, the dozer line was very destructive to the plants in its path. Western leatherwood is rhizomatous, so plants that were burned may be able to re-sprout from rhizomes.

It may not be possible to assess the full effects of the fire on the *Dirca* until next year or later, depending upon next winter's rainfall and the response of the *Dirca*.

\* About *Dirca occidentalis* being ranked CNPS 1B.2: a CNPS rare plant ranking of **1B** means rare, threatened, or endangered in California and elsewhere. The **0.2** means a "threat rank" of moderately threatened in California. The CNPS ranking is noted in the CNPS rare plant list, which is a continually updated list of sensitive rare plant species that assesses the current conservation status of our state's rare, threatened and endangered plants. #### FIELD TRIPS

## Sat Sep 24 9am - 1pm Oaks of Edgewood (San **Mateo County**)

Join Paul Heiple and Ken Himes to learn about the five species of Quercus, the true oaks, that occur in Edgewood County Park and Natural Preserve.

Our oak hike will be along a partial loop of about 4 miles on the Clarkia Trail, Serpentine Trail, Sylvan Trail, and Live Oak Trail to see the scrub oaks. In addition, we'll see at least two hybrid oaks. Hopefully, we will have a good crop of acorns to help with oak ID. We'll also feature oak galls, which are another aid to identify oaks.

Bring a hat, sunscreen, water and snacks. Wear sturdy footwear. Bring a hand lens or loupe if you have one.

# Sun Sep 25 9am - Noon Beginner's Bird and Plant ID Walk at Lake Cunningham Park (San Jose)

The lake is a major destination for waterfowl and migratory birds, and the park's native garden draws many birds for its habitat value.
