We have an exciting new venue for the September Seed and Cutting Exchange: The Kirk Park Native Plant Pollinator

Garden in San Jose. We have reserved the park's picnic area for the event.

Come explore the 14K square foot native plant garden at Kirk Park. There will be garden docents onsite and a nearby picnic table area with free seeds and cuttings. Live examples of many of the cuttings available can be viewed in the garden itself! We will have live,



interactive cutting demonstrations, so you can learn to start your very own cuttings at home. You may also bring your own containers for transporting cuttings. Our Wildflower Ambassadors will be distributing free seed packets and information. Seed packets will include both wildflower annuals and perennials. Some of the individual annual wildflower packets include lupines, clarkias, tidy tips and more! For unpackaged, loose seeds, small coin envelopes will be provided.

It is not necessary to bring anything if you do not have native material to share. However, if you have native plant material from your garden that you would like to share, please bring it along. Be sure to label your contributions for easy browsing – helpful growing tips and photos of the plants in bloom are appreciated. You may find it useful to use <u>Calscape.org</u> for this purpose; there is a link on the plant's information page that allows you to create a printable sign for most native species and cultivars. If you bring cuttings, please ensure they remain cool and moist in a bucket of water.

Gardening for Monarchs A Talk by Shelkie Tao

(In Person Only)

Monday October 27 7:00 - 8:30 PM, Sunnyvale Library Program Room, 665 W. Olive Ave., Sunnyvale

Since the 1980s, Western monarch butterfly populations have plummeted by more than 95%, putting this iconic species at risk of disappearing within our lifetime. In this talk, we'll explore the fascinating life cycle and epic migration of the Western monarch, uncover the key reasons behind its dramatic decline and highlight the urgent need for action. You'll learn how habitat loss, pesticides and climate change have shaped their struggle – and, more importantly, what each of us can do to help.

From planting native milkweed to creating pollinatorfriendly gardens, we'll look at simple yet powerful steps that can make a difference. Whether you're an experienced gardener or just getting started, you'll leave inspired to turn your outdoor space into a haven for monarchs.

Shelkie Tao is a landscape designer and founder of WaterEfficientGardens.com, an online design service specializing in low-water, California native and pollinator-friendly gardens. She has designed numerous pollinator habitats where monarch butterflies have been successfully observed,



contributing to their conservation. Before founding Water Efficient Gardens, Shelkie spent over a decade in the Silicon Valley high-tech industry. She holds a Certificate of Achievement in Environmental Horticulture and Design from Foothill College and an MBA from the UCLA Anderson School of Management.

Native Plant ID

Native Plant ID was originally Keying with Natives and met once a month to work with botanical keys to identify samples brought in by various participants. With the increasing improvement of photo identification apps, interest in using keys seems to be waning. Over the past year, we have had a variety of presentations related to identification of specific plant groups including oaks, conifers, the chicory tribe, manzanitas, lupines and salvias. We also had a presentation on scientific plant names and their meanings.

This format seems to be popular, but it requires finding people with expertise to speak on these topics. GROWING NATIVES GARDEN TOUR

Garden Submittal Deadline October 31

The Growing Natives Garden Tour (GNGT) is looking for new gardens as well as returning gardens for the 2026 Tour. The tour dates for 2026 are Saturday, April 18, for gardens in the southern part of our area and Sunday, April 19, for northern gardens.

The deadline for garden submission is **Friday**, **October 31**. We encourage all home, school and community gardeners to submit their application.

We require that California natives be the focal point of the garden, with at least 70% of the garden being native plants.

The gardens must not contain invasive plants and we encourage gardens that demonstrate sustainable gardening practice and show water conservation and habitat value for wildlife. Aesthetically pleasing design is another quality we look for, whether your garden is do-ityourself or professionally designed. Our garden teams will be reviewing gardens starting October to December.



Garden owners or managers from southern San Mateo County and Santa Clara County are encouraged to apply. To do that, visit GNGT.org, scroll the page up a bit, then tap/click on "Submit Your Garden for the 2026 Tour."

CHAPTER SERVICE OUTINGS

Our Chapter leads several ongoing habitat restoration and city native plant garden projects. The workdays depend on the project; read on to find the schedule and how to volunteer at each project. But first, let's learn how Chapter members volunteered in July at a planting of new native plants at San Jose's Rainbow Park Native Garden.

Chapter Members Volunteer at Rainbow Park Native Garden

On July 19th, San Jose's Adopt-A-Park program hosted a volunteer day to revitalize the native garden at Rainbow Park in West San Jose (Rainbow Drive & Donington Drive). Around 30 volunteers participated, planting 40-50 native plants and adding fresh mulch. The plants were donated by the non-profit Beautiful Day. Several members of our Chapter, including Kathy Kleinsteiber, Shelkie Tao, and Carol Mattsson, were among the volunteers.

In the month following the event, Shelkie, Carol and other volunteers have been regularly deep-watering the new

plants. Despite several days with temperatures over 90°F, the plants are thriving and establishing themselves well.

Alum Rock Park Restoration

Come help us weed non-native, invasive plants at this natural gem of San Jose. Our habitat restoration efforts allow the native plants to "come to light."

Our workdays take place every Monday and Wednesday at 8:30 am, and on the second Saturday morning of each month. No experience is necessary. All tools and instruction will be provided. Please bring a filled water bottle, snacks, sunscreen, sunhat and insect repellent if you need it; wear trail/off-trail footwear, long pants and a long-sleeved shirt.

Lately we have been clearing weeds that grew extra tall as a result of last spring's abundant rainfall. We have also started some pruning for fire mitigation. The City of San Jose cannot fully staff their parks even to keep the trails clear of non-native thistles, so there is plenty of work for project volunteers. New volunteers are welcome!

Forms and reservations are required to volunteer. Start by visiting the City's volunteer opportunities page at www.sanjoseca.gov/your-government/departmentsoffices/parks-recreation-neighborhood-services/getinvolved/volunteer-with-us. You will see Alum Rock Park Trail Crew as one of the options. The next **Saturday** workday is September 13, from 8:45am to noon.

For the Monday/Wednesday workdays, our actual meeting spot can vary and on rare occasions we may cancel due to weather or dangerous conditions. Please contact Todd Haves at ultratoddh@gmail.com before vou attend, for more information and instructions on where to park.

Workdays take place on **Saturdays from 8:00 to 10:00am**. New volunteers are welcome; City-issued guidelines are followed. The work depends on the season, mainly weeding and mulching year-round, but some planting in winter. Edgewood Restoration

Help restore habitat at Edgewood Park and Natural Preserve, near Redwood City, known for fabulous wildflowers and amazing diversity. Weeders see far more than weeds: they get to be up close to the native plants, some of which are seen only by weeders.

Sturdy gloves are recommended; you might also want to bring sunscreen, water, a hat, layered clothing and wear long sleeves/pants.

We weed year-round every Friday at 9:00am. During Daylight Savings Time we also weed on Wednesdays at 5:30pm. For an overview, please visit www.cnpsscv.org/restoration/edgewood-park.

Cataldi Park Native Garden

Join us to restore habitat in San Jose's Cataldi Park. This project aims to remove invasive plants and restore California native plants in a 1/2-acre area on the western end of Cataldi Park in San Jose.

Volunteer work days take place on Saturdays from 9:00 to 11:00am. New volunteers are welcome; City-issued guidelines are followed.

Activities depend on the season. We start planting in late fall after the first rain and continue into the winter months as needed. Spring is the time for controlling weeds and taking care of the young saplings. During the summer and early fall, we irrigate/water the plants, prune established plants and sheet mulch adjacent areas in preparation for planting. As of July, the project had fully used up the 50cubic-yard mulch pile provided by San Jose Adopt-A-Park and park staff last year. It has been extremely helpful in controlling weeds.

Wear a hat and garden shoes and bring water to stay hydrated. Work gloves will be provided.

Kirk Park Pollinator Garden

Community volunteers regularly care for this native plant garden at Kirk Park in San Jose. We are always happy to have help at the garden! We meet regularly on Saturday mornings from 9:00 to 11:00am, weather permitting, for light maintenance such as weeding, watering; and occasionally we have plants or seeds to plant or mulch to spread.

The park is open every day, so please come visit! The garden is located along the north edge of the park. We can also notify you if, for some reason, we will not be meeting. New volunteers will need to fill out a form for the City.

FIELD TRIPS

Chapter field trips are free and generally open to the public. They are oriented to conservation, protection and enjoyment of California native plants and wildlife and we adhere to all rules and guidelines for the lands on which we are visiting.

In our region it is very important to be prepared for hiking on rugged and steep terrain, wide temperature ranges and rapidly changing conditions at any time of year. All participants should wear sturdy footwear and carry sufficient water, sun protection, food, clothing layers, personal first aid and other supplies you may need. If you have any questions about your ability to participate in a particular field trip, please contact the trip leader in advance.

Cell service is mainly restricted to cities and major highways. To find your way to an outing, please do not rely solely on your phone.

Sun, Sept 21, 9:00am - Noon Bird and Plant ID Walk at Lake Cunningham Park (San Jose)

With the onset of Fall, join us for a beginner's bird and plant identification walk through Lake Cunningham Park. This lake is a major destination for waterfowl and migratory birds and its Native Garden draws many birds due to its habitat value. On this walk, Vicki Silvas-Young will show you how to identify the common and some migrant birds of this area, while Arvind Kumar will identify the native plants that they depend on for food and shelter.

The distance is 2 miles round-trip on a level path. Bring a hat, water, your bird and plant lists and binoculars. Wear comfortable walking shoes. **Parking fee is \$6, credit card only.**

Sat, Sep 27, 10:00am – 12:30pm Fire Ecology and Forest Management (Loma Mar)

Join Vivian Neou and Ray Curiel on an excursion at the northernmost edge of the CZU Lightning Complex Fires of 2020. We will walk along Old Haul Road, one of the fire

breaks. Along the way we'll discuss details of the fire's impacts to Pescadero Creek County Park, in addition to historic logging impacts, fire ecology and the natural role it plays in forest health. We'll contrast how understory plants such as ceanothus, huckleberry and more responded to the burn as compared to those that were not touched by fire.

We'll also talk about the San Mateo County Park Department's plans for forest management to improve ecosystem health, and how the department is planning to implement work from the County's Climate and Habitat Resiliency Plan for the park. To learn more about the plan, visit www.smcgov.org/parks/pcp-climate-habitat-resiliency.

The hike will be 3 miles in length with some moderate uphill stretches. The closest restrooms are at nearby Memorial Park (approximately 0.4 miles up the road past the trailhead, as you approach the trailhead from the north), so plan on arriving a little early to use the facilities there if needed. There is no water on the trail, so fill water bottles in advance. Bring layers as it can be cold.

We will meet at Hoffman Creek Trailhead along Wurr Road at **10:00am**. The address is 1400 Wurr Road, Loma Mar, CA 94021 but using Hoffman Creek Trailhead is more reliable for locating the site.

After joining CNPS in 1997, Melanie quickly emerged as a vital contributor to the Chapter's horticultural initiatives. When the Chapter began hosting native plant garden tours, she was among the first to offer her garden as part of the tour. Her knowledge of native plants, combined with her meticulous approach to selecting and arranging them, turned her one-acre garden into a stunning native plant exhibit, providing the new tour with instant credibility. She became the tour's quiet champion and

backbone, consistently sharing her garden over the years, including this year's event. Her garden motivated many tour attendees to start or enhance their own native gardens.

Melanie's support for the tour extended beyond her garden – she was a gracious hostess, regularly inviting the tour to hold the annual volunteer potluck at her home. This generosity extended to volunteers from another area that was close to her heart – the CNPS SCV Nursery.

Jean Struthers, the nursery manager prior to Melanie, founded the nursery and managed it for nearly twenty years. Jean maintained high standards and it was only Melanie who could fulfill those expectations, enabling Jean to retire from her position as nursery manager.

Alongside her extensive knowledge of plants, Melanie's dedication, compassion, expertise, consideration and careful attention to detail made the nursery a friendly and pleasant environment for volunteers. She matched volunteers with tasks that fit their abilities and passions, engaging them in the decision-making processes related to the nursery's management. A wonderful cook, she would sometimes bring in delightful snacks to share and she organized an annual potluck in her garden for the nursery volunteers.

On workdays and during nursery events, she consistently arrived early and stayed late, often stopping by on other days as well. When phytophthora emerged as a threat, necessitating a complete overhaul of nursery procedures and a facility remodel, Melanie took the initiative to identify what needed to be done. It was a monumental task and she shouldered the majority of the workload. Her husband, Peter Cross, often helped with the many projects that she led.

When she realized being nursery manager was becoming too much for her, she notified the board that she needed to resign, but stayed on for several months to ensure a seamless transition for her successor. Despite stepping down as manager, she continued to support the nursery. After a brief hiatus, she resumed volunteering. She was like a fairy godmother, overseeing the nursery needs and tending to matters that required attention. She was always ready to answer questions and offer guidance and she continued to provide high quality propagation materials from her own garden for the nursery. Her generosity and kindness significantly enhanced the nursery in countless ways.

Melanie was also engaged in other Chapter activities, joining field trips and attending talks. She was a true gem, and we deeply feel her loss. A fund has been established in her memory to sponsor a picnic table and garden fund at Bol Park in Palo Alto, the site of another of Melanie's projects.
